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Amnesty Guideline



COMPETENCY RENEWALS AND NEW FIREARM LICENCE APPLICATIONS IN TERMS OF THE FIREARM AMNESTY 2020 – 1st August 2020 to 31st January 2021: A GUIDELINE

The following information serves as a guideline of what you ought to take with you and what you should expect when attending at your relevant SAPS station.

PROCESS:

1. Make an appointment with the Amnesty and/or Designated Firearms Officer (DFO) at your local SAPS station to attend to your amnesty, Competency (if your competency has expired) and new licence application.

Either telephonically or by attending on your local station.

The Amnesty application is typically dealt with by an Amnesty Official but could also be dealt with by the DFO at the smaller stations.

You may also have to deal with the SAPS 13 Official, whose function it is to physically receive and book in the surrendered firearm into the SAPS 13 Register.

2. Upon arrival at your local SAPS station, identify yourself, the purpose of your visit, and ask to see the Amnesty Official / SAPS 13 Official / DFO with whom you have an appointment.

3. You will have a full set of your fingerprints taken by the DFO for the competency renewal and/or new licence application. We suggest taking wet wipes with you to clean your hands after the process.

4. You will be asked to record your firearm and/or application and/or personal details into the SAPS 13 register book at SAPS.

Kindly take a photograph of the book as proof of submission of your application.

5. An example of the SAPS Amnesty form is on our website. You will be provided with a numbered Amnesty form at the station which you will need to complete. The numbered form provided by the Station will replace the example form.

6. Surrender your firearm, as this is a condition of the amnesty.

You are not required to hand in your firearm in a specific bag/case.

7. The competency renewal and new licence application will be typically dealt with by the DFO.

8. Be courteous to all SAPS officials as it will only improve your experience.

9. Do not worry if your DFO takes apart your application bundle – each station or DFO captures the application/s in their own manner – but do ensure that they have received and accepted everything.

10. You will be directed to the finance department where you will make payment for your application/s.

Ensure that you receive a receipt.

11. You will also receive an Acknowledgement of Receipt of Firearm Documentation form SAPS 523.

SAPS FORMS REQUIRED:

Amnesty form – SAPS 548 – is a numbered form and supplied by SAPS.

Surrender Form – SAPS 522(a) – is required for the surrender of the firearm

Forfeiture Form – SAPS 522 (b) – is required for the forfeiture of the firearm

Licence Application Form – SAPS 271 – is required for the new licence application

Competency Renewal Form – SAPS 517(g) – is required for the renewal of competency certificate

All the above forms are available on our website.

COST:

A competency renewal application costs R70.

A new firearm licence application costs R140 per application.

Payment in cash is required, and we advise taking the exact amount, if possible.

Further, ensure that you obtain a receipt as proof of payment.

AMMUNITION:

You are legally obliged to hand over your ammunition with the surrender of your firearm, unless you have a valid firearm licence for another firearm which uses the same ammunition.

You must provide at least one bullet with your firearm for ballistics purposes.

WHAT TO BRING WITH YOU ON THE DAY OF SUBMISSION:

- * SAPS Application/s completed for new licence, Competency and Surrender forms – which forms can be downloaded from SAGA's website
- * Motivational letter/s for the new licence application together with supporting documents.
- * Two passport-size colour photographs per application.
- * Write your name and ID number on the back of each photograph in case your photographs become separated from your application
- * Firearm and ammunition
- * Cash to pay for your application/s
- * Black pen
- * ID book
- * Original certificates if the copies in your application have not already been certified previously
- * Wet wipes

Make copies or scan all documentation that you are taking to SAPS, as the documentation can be lost or mislaid, and its imperative that you have a complete backup of everything.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS:

Can someone submit the application on my behalf?

No, you must submit the application yourself, in person. No one may submit the application or firearm on your behalf.

Do I need to surrender my firearm?

Yes, if you wish to make use of the amnesty you **MUST** surrender your firearm.

Is there risk involved with the surrender of my firearm?

Please note that whilst the SAPS are adamant and appear to have a better and secure system in place, there is always risk involved with the surrender of firearms.

Must I surrender my firearm at the same time that I submit my amnesty application/s?

You are required to surrender your firearm at the same time as submitting your amnesty application/s. However, if this is not possible for whatever reason, you have 14 calendar days within which to return to submit the new licence application and competency (if your previous one expired), although we recommend submitting all at the same time if possible.

May I complete SAPS documents with a coloured pen or pencil?

You must sign all documentation using a black pen, and no other colour is acceptable, nor is a pencil acceptable.

What is the procedure should I not wish to apply for a new licence and want to dispose of the firearm?

Should you decide not to apply for a new licence in terms of the amnesty and want to dispose of the firearm with an expired licence, you are required to complete the SAPS 522 (a) surrender and SAPS 522 (b) forfeiture forms.

What about scopes and accessories?

We suggest that you remove all accessories like scopes, mounts and rings, rails, silencers and even expensive stocks. You may not damage the firearm and may not remove bolts, slides, triggers, etc. You do not have to surrender magazines.

New shooters should look at the ATA or DTL Trap disciplines or NSSA Skeet to start. The reason for this is that ATA and DTL are the foundation disciplines for the more difficult disciplines of Olympic Trap/Olympic Double-Trap and Universal Trench; and NSSA Skeet is the foundation discipline for Olympic Skeet and the Sporting disciplines.



If you are a keen bird shooter then you should start with NSSA Skeet because you will learn to shoot a wider variety of targets compared with ATA/DTL Trap.

Sporting Clays are those which are thrown in an apparently random manner, hence the wide variation of angles, trajectories and size of targets. Our advice is not to start on this discipline because it

requires more technique than Trap and Skeet. However, if this discipline appeals to you then we strongly advise that you start shooting Skeet from which you will transition to Sporting Clays much more easily and with greater skill.

One of the wonderful things about Clay Target Shooting is that it is NOT an equipment race. Yes, you can spend lots of hard-earned cash on very fancy shotguns with beautiful engraving - but they won't make you shoot that much better. Depending on your budget, you might even want to buy a second hand shotgun. This is a good idea in the beginning because many people change their minds about which discipline they will end up pursuing or, they simply take it more seriously and want to invest in a new shotgun.

Clay Target Shooting is best shot with a 12 gauge over-and-under shotgun. This is not to say that you can't use a side-by-side. But, in order to get the best out of the sport, either an over-and-under or a semi-automatic shotgun is best.

A semi-automatic shotgun is great for those who are very young, very old or for someone who doesn't like too much

Under Trap, we shoot ATA Trap, DTL Trap and ATA Trap Doubles. This generally requires a longer barrelled shotgun with tight chokes. The targets in NSSA Skeet are set much closer than in Trap. Therefore, the type of shotgun used requires less choke constriction and shorter barrels.

Instead of opting for a specific trap or skeet shotgun, a really good "all-rounder" shotgun is a 28" barrel length for a lady and a 30" barrel length for a gentleman. The stock should come with an adjustable comb and the barrels should be multi-choked. This covers both Trap and Skeet targets and as a bonus it can also work for Sporting targets!

Clay busting delivers enjoyment and satisfaction from the social level right through to international competitions. No matter what level you shoot - as long as you learn and implement the correct safety procedures and go and have a great time on the shooting ranges!

The CTSASA is an Accredited Sports Shooting Association and supplies their members with a Dedicated Membership Certificate to assist with their applications for firearm licences. In order to qualify for this, you need to be a full member (club, provincial association and the CTSASA) and shoot 200 competition targets each year.

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recoil. Bear in mind that the firearms legislation requires you to be a Dedicated Sportshooter in order to get a licence for a semi-automatic shotgun.

For as far back as I can remember, my father always stored a shotgun in the hall closet. It was on the top shelf, away from us kids, nestled atop a bunch of winter scarves. The hall closet was located right next to my parents' bedroom, so if he needed to get to that shotgun quickly, he could do it. I don't recall the gauge, but I do remember it was a pump-action shotgun that he nicknamed "The Attitude Adjuster."

We were fortunate that we lived in a safe neighborhood, so he never had to adjust any attitudes.

Decades later during the COVID-19 pandemic, millions of children will be home for many hours for distance or "virtual" learning. parents are returning to work, sometimes leaving older children home alone.

"In this unprecedented time when school-age children are spending more time at home than ever before, safely handling and securely storing firearms when not in use are the best ways to help prevent accidents, thefts and misuse," says Joe Bartozzi, President & CEO of the National Shooting Sports Foundation (NSSF).

Follow these five top tips to find out the best ways to store your firearms at home to keep your family safe.

1. Be proactive. Your guns are your responsibility. You are responsible for making sure your firearms are not accessible to anyone but yourself especially curious children! With the exception of a concealed or openly carried firearm in a secure holster, you should always unload firearms when they are not in use. Depending upon your individual situation, you might consider storing the ammo in a separate location.

2. Think like a kid. When we were little, my Dad stored most of his firearms in locked cabinets down in the basement. The key to those cabinets was placed on top of the cabinet, way out of our

reach. And as I mentioned earlier, the "Attitude Adjuster" shotgun was stored on the top shelf of a closet. Notice a pattern here? If you have small children, store your firearms in locations inaccessible to them.

But remember your own childhood and how resourceful kids can be! Make sure they cannot use a chair, step ladder, etc. to access the firearms. Most importantly, be sure to tell them that their friends are forbidden from looking for firearms in your house.

3. Explore your options. Trigger locks are a simple and affordable option for preventing a gun from being loaded or fired by an unauthorized user. A trigger shoe clamps down around the trigger to prevent the trigger from being squeezed. Most new guns purchased today come with a trigger lock right in the box.

Cable locks block the action of the firearm, preventing the action of rifles and shotguns from being closed. When used with a pistol, a cable lock prevents the magazine from being loaded into the grip.

Gun cases come in a wide variety of shapes, sizes and price ranges.

Most soft and hard cases can be locked with a padlock through the zipper pull or carry handle. Note: While a locked gun case should keep little hands off the gun, they are my least favorite in terms of security because someone can break in to your house/car, and steal both the gun and the case in a minute.

Strong boxes and security cases are available at most sporting goods stores and big-box home goods stores. Their prices range depending on how techy you prefer their locking mechanism to be (some have a fingerprint reader). These units are my favorite for my pistols, because they are inexpensive and give me quick access to my firearms in a defensive situation.

Locking gun cabinets are the next level up when it comes to safely storing guns, especially if they are made of thick, heavy-duty steel. They come in a variety of sizes, and are not too heavy, making them versatile to carry up or down steps (with the help of a friend). You can pop one in your bedroom (for every day security), and bring a second one in the basement (for your hunting rifles/shotguns). Just keep in mind that if you and a buddy can carry them in, a burglar and his buddy can carry them out, so be sure to attach the cabinet to a wall or the floor.

Gun safes are the most secure gun storage option. Even the least expensive safe is superior to any other storage option in preventing unauthorized access to firearms. The weight of the safe, the heavy-gauge steel of the outer box, the complex locking mechanism and the option to bolt the safe directly

to a concrete slab, all combine to frustrate would-be burglars.

Note from SAGA: In South Africa we are obliged by law to keep our firearms in a safe. We may not use a gun case, strong box, security case or gun cabinet.

4. Put on your teacher's cap.

When they are old enough, make sure your children are aware and understand the safety guidelines concerning firearms. Most children are at this point when they demonstrate good behavior, reasoning and self-control when you show them your guns, or other dangerous items, such as knives.

Drill in to them the following basic safety tips, and ask your children to repeat them back to you, word for word. Repeat as often as necessary:

** Always keep the muzzle of a gun pointed in a safe direction.

** Always keep your finger off the trigger until you are ready to shoot

** Always keep the gun unloaded until ready to fire

5. Teach them what to do if they do find a gun. Teach your children NRA's Eddie Eagle Gun Safe mantra, which is, "If you see a gun, STOP! DON'T TOUCH! LEAVE THE AREA! TELL AN ADULT."

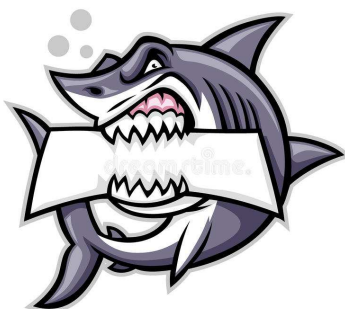
How to Avoid Slide Bite

It's like a horror flick, and it happens almost daily on every busy range in America. It's like when the girl in the nightgown wakes up to a strange noise outside her window. Instead of calling the cops, she wanders outside to look around. Meanwhile, you, the viewer, can see the moon's reflection off Count Dracula's fangs as he hides in the shadows. The creepy music starts, and you know exactly what's going to happen next. It's the same thing when a veteran shooter sees a novice gripping a semi-automatic handgun incorrectly by placing a portion of the hand behind and above the gun's slide. You can see it coming from a mile away—usually from the other side of the plexiglass partition at the local gun range—but you rarely have time to stop it. Moments later the shooter fires and is frightened as he looks at his hand then shakes it while mouthing the word "Ouch!"

He's just received a slide bite, which is a little cut on the web of the hand between the thumb and forefinger that's caused by the sharp metal edge of the slide as it recoils rearward. Luckily, it's not a bad injury—it's like a nasty paper cut—but it does serve as a poignant reminder to always grip the gun properly even as the majority of your concentration is focused on the sights and target.

While some people might think slide bite is a product of human anatomy combined with oddball gun design, it's not. Fact is, human hands are very similar in shape,



as are the grip designs of the vast majority of handguns. To prevent slide bite, one must simply grip the handgun properly. Many new shooters just don't know any better. If you don't wish to be the unwitting victim of slide bite, simply heed the following advice.

Currently, only a small fraction of handgun instructors advocate wrapping the left thumb of the support hand around the back strap (the lower portion of the thumb) of their right hand when shooting a revolver. While this technique may give the right wrist a little more support while also keeping the left thumb handy to cock a revolver, it doesn't translate well to semiautos. That's because this grip often places the left thumb higher than the bottom of a semiauto's slide as it recoils. When contact is made, the slide often cuts the hand. So while some people simply don't know any better, some shooters mistakenly use their revolver grip while shooting a semiauto.

To avoid slide bite, first grip the handgun sturdily with your right hand (if you are right-handed). Keep your trigger finger on the frame of the gun and off of the trigger. Grip the firearm as high

on the backstrap as possible without encroaching into the slide's rearward path. (Most guns have a bobtail that prevents this, but to check clearance if you are unsure, rack the slide back while maintaining the grip. If it strikes your hand, your grip is too high.)

Next, incorporate your left hand into the grip by first moving your right thumb up and out of the way. This will expose most of the left side of the grip panel. Now, point your left thumb toward the target, and try to fit the meatiest part of your left palm (the thumb muscle) on as much of the grip panel as possible. When you've done it correctly, your left thumb will point toward the target along the frame of the gun. Now, lower your right thumb down until it's parallel to and resting on top of your left thumb so that both thumbs now point toward the target alongside the same side of the frame. This modern semiauto handgun grip is superior to old grips in terms of speed, control and accuracy. It will also inherently prevent slide bite, because there will be no part of either hand behind the slide and high enough to get bitten.

No longer will you be the soon-to-be eaten character in the horror show that is slide bite, but rather, a member of the audience who gasps as another unwitting victim gets the fang.

2A Taste Test: 6 Second Amendment-Friendly Coffees

If we had to pinpoint the exact moment Second Amendment coffee companies were born, I would have to say it was when that big coffee chain (you know the one) took a hard stance against open carry and asked us to leave our guns at home. Well, with that statement dozens of competitors were born, all of whom support the Right to Keep and Bear Arms. Today, we're running a taste test on six Second Amendment-friendly brews to perk up your morning.

1. Filthy Pirate

Filthy Pirate is one of the newest players in the game and, like any veteran-owned company, they deserve a spot in this round-up. Their success has been so overwhelming that they have opened a walk-in establishment right in their hometown of Tucson. Thanks to the Arizona heat, their most popular offering is the cold brew.

I liked that it came in six individual bags instead of one big one, as this allows you to brew it in small quantities or adjust strength to

individual tastes. The recommended dosage yielded a product that was about as dark as iced tea. I found it to be perfect just the way it was on the 85-degree day that we drank it. The brew itself was very refreshing as initially it cleanses the palate like an iced tea and then the flavor profile starts to develop at the edges of the tongue before it fills in. Needless to say, this brew did not last long in our house.

2. Operator Coffee

Operator Coffee is another veteran-owned coffee company. My first exposure to this brand was during their 2019 Try & Buy event. A portion of the proceeds of each bag of coffee goes towards SOWW (Special Operations Wounded Warriors), making it easy to click the buy button. We tried four different roasts from OC, each with its unique strength and tasting notes.

Roast 22 is their medium blend, with the moniker referencing the average number of veterans who are lost to suicide every day. It's a reminder that grabbing a cup of coffee and calling someone who you suspect needs an ear can make all the difference. The grinds were of a good, coarse consistency, making it ideal for a French press or a campfire percolator. We found it to be a good all-around coffee with a powerful message.

The SWAT and Trident roasts offer a step up or down in strength with a traditional profile to their respective target tastes. SWAT had a more intense flavor, hitting the front of your mouth first. While the company claims notes of chocolate, roasted nuts and berries, the flavor is so intense it's hard to pick out any one of these in abundance. This indicates the perfect balance of all of these flavor notes leaving you with a lot going on.

Breacher's blend is exactly what you would think. It is their darkest roast and yields a remarkably full-bodied cup of joe, delivering most of its flavor to the back of the palate. This quickly became my go-to for late-night cigars on the porch. <https://operatorcoffee.com/>

3. Hunter's Blend

Second Amendment coffee is most often associated with the military and the tactical minded, but what about those who just enjoy an extended sit in the frozen-foods section? Hunter's Blend is owned by a trio of active sportsmen who seek to uplift local farmers and do their part to conserve the environment. We were lucky enough to sample both their Original and their Black Powder blend for this evaluation. The Original is exactly what you would expect, just a good balanced blend perfect for any time of day. It had the punch to wake you up, without making you so jittery that you'd miss your shot on that early-morning trophy buck.

The Black Powder blend was more like double-based nitro smokeless and got things up and running in a hurry. This blend is a great option if you need to stay up late enough howling at the moon to see what decides to howl back. It was exceptionally rich, yet smooth—and was likely the most aesthetically pleasing grind that we set eyes on during our testing. <https://www.huntersblendcoffee.com>

4. CMMG Coffee

Yep, the same folks responsible for high-end firearms now deliver high-end coffee. CMMG is no stranger to food products. They currently offer Tactical Bacon and Tactical Beef sticks...so coffee just made sense as the next logical range refreshment. The three blends that they came up with were Safe, Semi-Auto and Full-

Auto. The clever names are easy to decipher as Safe is the light blend, Semi is the medium, and Full is, well, full. We found that the Full-Auto had the taste that you would expect from a dark roast, however it did come with a touch of bitterness in the finish. Semi-Auto and Safe follow the same flavor profiles just dialed up or down. Each one delivered the intensity that you would expect and displayed a fine balance of smoothness to bitterness. Hopefully next year they come out with Tactical Hash Browns and you'll have yourself a complete breakfast! CMMG Provisions

5. EDC Coffee

EDC Coffee boldly supports law enforcement and the concealed carry community. We liked that they had some of the rarest blends on the market, to include a Kona and a Jamaican Blue. To keep the playing field level we kept to their standard brews which included the Tanto, Slip Joint and Drop Point Blends. Drop point comprises the company's medium roast; it was very light in color and exceptionally smooth.

Next, we sampled the Tanto, which we opted for in the coffee pod format. I found these to be flavorful and "punchy" even at the 10 oz. setting on my coffee maker. They earned a lot of points here because K-Cup style coffee is rarely ever as strong as I want it to be (or maybe I just have some problems).

Also in our sample kit was a 2-oz. pack of Slip-Joint. This brew is intended for an espresso machine, but it brewed quite well in my no-name drip machine. The flavor was on par with any other espresso blend we sampled during this evaluation, and we appreciated the option of trying a small sample before committing to a full-sized bag. <https://edccoffeeco.com/>

6. Black Rifle Coffee

Our last brand is likely the best known of the batch, and has a tremendous industry presence both through their social media outlets and their publication "Coffee or Die." Yes, from humble beginnings with just one offering, The Black Rifle Coffee Company now has dozens of different

blends and a handy subscription option to help keep the go-juice flowing.

We started our flight with the Suppressor Smooth blend which lived up to its name and didn't produce any bite at all. It makes a perfect wake up blend as the citrus tones get the mouth watering, alleviating even the worst case of morning dry-mouth.

Moving on to Black Beard's Delight we had a chance to experience the brilliant flavor of a 100 percent Brazilian roast. It engulfed the palate with a bouquet of flavors, yet didn't finish with any anticipated bite. We wrapped things up with the AK espresso roast. This extra full-flavored grind hits the taste buds like 7.62 x 39 and finished strong, definitely for the more advanced coffee drinkers in the group. This offering is perfect if you are looking for a cappuccino that doesn't lose any strength to its froth.

How to Choose the Right Concealed Handgun Carry Position

There's a learning curve when it comes to concealed carry, and even though I've carried different firearms over the years in different holsters and in different positions I'm always seeking the best carry combo for my own personal use.

A firearm that is inaccessible is of little value, and if your holster is uncomfortable then there's a good chance you won't carry your pistol every day. Here's a look at five key factors to consider when purchasing a carry gun, holster, and when finding the best carry position for your personal defense firearm.

Is The Gun Safe and Secure?

This should always be your primary concern. While most new CCW permit holders focus on concealability and comfort, safety and security are the most critical factors when choosing a carry setup. The gun should fit snugly and securely in the holster and should ride close to your body (which is why carrying loose in a pocket is generally a bad idea), and the firearm should only exit the holster when you intentionally draw. Be certain that your firearm's trigger is covered and that the holster holds the gun securely in place in any position. Always be certain your holster properly fits your specific firearm.

Does the Holster Position Allow You to Comfortably Sit, Stand and Kneel?

Some carry positions severely limit your range of motion and impede natural movements. If you're constantly repositioning the firearm throughout the day, or are forced to keep your body in a certain position you'll be uncomfortable...and there's a good chance you won't carry the gun every day.

Whether you opt to position your firearm at the 3 o'clock position on your hip, on the small of your back or in the appendix position in the front of the body, take the time to determine which position offers you the most comfort and widest range of natural motion.

Is the Firearm Accessible?

This is critically important. A comfortable, secure carry position is of little value if the firearm is located where you'll have to dig through your outer garments to reach the gun. This is an easy one to test—with an unloaded firearm, practice reaching for and drawing the gun with the type of clothes you'll be wearing every day. The best carry positions will allow you to reach the firearm with either hand should the need arise.

Is The Firearm Concealable?

If your firearm is positioned so that it prints every time you move, then you aren't really concealing your concealment gun. It's very important to find a carry position that allows you to carry year-

round, during the hottest summer months and in the dead of winter. Garment selection also plays a role in concealability, and having an open cover garment that works with the ambient temperature is essential for year-round carry. In the warm months I've found that a lightweight, breathable short-sleeved shirt left unbuttoned works particularly well with most carry options, especially if the shirt has a heavy hem (so it doesn't blow open in the wind) and a "busy" pattern that disrupts the outline of a carry gun.

Will a Single Carry Position/Style Work for You?

Maybe not. For example, you may find that an inside-the-waistband (IWB) holster with the gun at the 3 o'clock position is best for times when you'll be on your feet during the day, but that a crossdraw rig is better when you are sitting or driving. Ideally, you can find one carry setup that checks every box for your daily routine, but be prepared to adjust as-needed so that you have multiple options for certain circumstances.
