REVIEW: A Critical Assessment of Reflexive Shooting – Stress Under Fire

1. Fight, Flight or Freeze: The Truth About Real Encounters

In real-world defensive shootings, initiative and speed often matter more than textbook accuracy. When adrenaline surges, fine motor skills – like deliberate sight alignment – frequently degrade. We default to gross-motor, instinctive actions.

As Colion Noir argues in "Training For A Gunfight: This One Skill Matters More Than Accuracy," YouTube June 2025, conventional range-based drills OFTEN fail to replicate the violent, chaotic nature of real-life self-defence scenarios. What matters in those first seconds is action – fast, decisive, and effective. This is where reflexive (point) shooting has context.

Initiative and time advantage can often determine survival. Reflexive shots delivered rapidly under stress may not be perfect, but they delay and disrupt the attacker's plan. This is why reflexive shooting – properly trained – remains a life-saving skill.

Key Takeaway: Initiative matters, but even with modern optics (red dots), performance under pressure demands preparation – not gear dependency.

2. What Is Reflexive (Stress Reflex) Shooting?

Reflexive or Stress Reflex Shooting, also known as instinctive or point

shooting, refers to rapid, unsighted fire driven by target focus and neural imprinting. It typically occurs within the first critical second of a deadly force encounter.

Key Features:

Target Focus: Shooter's eyes lock on the threat; the firearm follows through trained neural pathways.

Instinctive Response: Draw and fire happen in one subconscious, gross-motor movement.

Stress Realism: Tunnel vision, auditory exclusion and adrenaline dominating the response is highly likely.

Most civilian firearm owners in South Africa lack exposure to stress-inoculated training. Expecting perfect follow-through or conscious sight alignment in the first second of a sudden threat is dangerously unrealistic. Elite police and military units succeed because their neural ('muscle') memory carries them when deliberate planning fails.

Key Takeaway: Train for the first chaotic second – point shoot to survive, then transition to sighted precision.

3. Red Dots vs Irons: Context Matters

While modern red dot optics can improve target acquisition, especially for experienced shooters, that advantage can disappear under pressure if the fundamentals have not been stress ingrained. Its predominantly skill, coupled with the correct equipment, which wins the fight.

Modern red dot optics are increasingly shifting how trained shooters respond under stress. A properly zeroed optic viewed through a generously sized aperture can present naturally in the line of sight, even in high-pressure situations. But this advantage depends entirely on training. Inexperienced shooters often fail to locate or stabilize the dot during the initial fight-or-flight surge.

Instinctive or point shooting typically dominates the first few (1-3) shots of an encounter. As the threat becomes more defined – or if there are multiple threats in close quarters – unsighted fire may extend until the shooter can re-establish visual and cognitive control. Repetition, composure and exposure to stress determine how quickly you transition back to sighted fire.

Key Takeaway: Red dots work, if your training does. Reflexive fire is not about ignoring your sights. It is about when you cannot afford to wait for them to perfectly align.

4. Fundamentals First – then Stress Adaptation

Reflexive shooting does not replace the seven fundamentals, it adapts them for the moment when those fine-motor skills collapse. Unless these fundamentals have been hard-wired through repetition under pressure, they may fall apart when it counts the most.

Close-quarters rifle engagements may allow more latitude for point shooting due to higher terminal energy, but with handguns – where stopping power is lower – sight alignment must resume as soon as possible. The goal is to get rounds on target fast, then transition into refined, aimed fire to decisively incapacitate the threat.

Key Takeaway: Practice does not make perfect. Practice makes permanent. Train the transition from instinct to discipline.

5. Combat Proven: From WWII to CQB

Reflexive shooting is not new – it has a combat-tested legacy: WWII pioneers like Fairbairn and Applegate trained soldiers to shoot instinctively at close range, understanding that chaos overrides precision in a fight.

U.S. military "Quick Kill" and modern "Reflexive Fire" drills remain foundational in close-quarters combat (CQB) training.

In modern CQB rifle work, point shooting remains valid at extreme-close distances. However, with pistols, sighted fire regains importance quickly due to their lower terminal performance. In pistol combat, reflexive fire may win the moment – but sighted fire ends the fight.

Key Takeaway: Reflexive shooting is the bridge from reaction to control. Use it wisely – then shift to precision.

6. Sports Shooting ≠ Gunfighting

Disciplines like IPSC and IDPA develop extraordinary technical shooting ability—but they are not defensive shooting. Stress in sport arises from competition, not survival. While high-level competitors possess outstanding neural memory, their training often omits crucial elements: cover, concealment, movement under fire, and a survival mindset with a solid guarded assessment of any further threats post the actual engagement.

Some competitive shooters will adapt well under threat, but others may struggle to recalibrate from range logic to street logic.

Key Takeaway: Sports skill is an asset but not a substitute – self-defence requires tactical layering.

7. Sighted vs Reflexive: Know the Differences

Aspect	Reflexive Shooting	Sports Shooting
Focus:	Threat-driven, instinctive	Accuracy-driven, sight-based
Speed:	Sub second reaction times	Controlled under match pressure
Mindset:	Survival, close contact	Competition, no real threat

8. Train to Survive: Noir's Rule Holds True

Gunfights are chaotic, unpredictable, and unforgiving. As Colion Noir wisely warns, "You won't rise to the occasion – you'll fall to the lowest level of your training."

The formula for surviving:

- * Fire your initial shots quickly using point shooting (this may be instinctive already),
- * Follow up with sighted fire for 'no miss' precision.

Train point shooting for initial contact. Then build your ability to engage with rapid, accurate sighted fire – under time, under stress, and under movement. That is the path to real proficiency, always mindful you are solely responsible for every round fired.

Key Takeaway: Reflexive fire buys survival time but it is not enough unless you transition to precision under control.

9. Building the Complete Shooter

The most capable shooters combine both skill sets. Novice and intermediate shooters must first master the fundamentals – under calm conditions – before graduating into pressure-based drills.

Precision Drills: Grip, stance, trigger control and marksmanship at range.

Reflexive Drills: Retention fire, movement and extremely close-contact scenarios.

Integrated Drills: Transitioning from point shooting into aimed fire – under time and stress.

Key Takeaway: Balanced shooters do not just shoot fast – they shoot smart, adaptively and lawfully.

10. Conclusion: Reflexive Fire is not Reckless – It is Real

Ask any serious defensive trainer or force-on-force instructor, in the first moment of real threat, most people do not align their sights. They react. It is not the tightest group that wins – it is the shooter who acts first, delivers effective force and adapts to changing dynamics without losing composure.

The crucial warning: **Reflexive shooting is highly contextual.** Its value increases in extremely close-range engagements, when distance is compressed, when the number of assailants is high, and when milliseconds matter more than accuracy. In longer-range or more controlled situations, unsighted fire may be reckless, not effective.

Reflexive fire is a tool – not a tactic for every fight.

Understanding when and how to use it is as important as mastering the technique itself. Reflexive shooting is not a shortcut around fundamentals – it is about apply them under life-or-death pressure and there in is the gap traditional range drills rarely address.

Train smart and realistically. Train with a winning mindset.

Annexure: Reflex vs Sighted Test Table

To demonstrate the accuracy and speed differences between reflexive and sighted, Matt a highly experience combat shooter, ran the Mozambique Drill (2 shots to centre mass + 1 to head) at 3-5m on an outdoor range under good weather conditions:

Drill	Reflexive Shooting	Hits	Sighted Shooting	Hits	VAR
Attempt 1	2.22 sec	2 of 3	2.24 sec	3 of 3	-0.02 sec
Attempt 2	2.02 sec	2 of 3	2.26 sec	3 of 3	-0.24 sec
Average	2.12 sec	67%	2.25 sec	100%	-0.13 sec

Note: While this test is unofficial it is presented merely for interest. In this test reflexive shooting was on average 0.13 seconds quicker at a 67% hit rate (smaller point of impact within the A zone) – still fatal.

16 August: My Mom is My Bodyguard

SA Tactical Institute hosted its fourth annual "My Mom is My Bodyguard" programme, a special initiative to empower women with self-defence skills. The event, held at the Colt Shooting Range in Verulam was a full-house, with 30 women from Verulam and the surrounding communities in attendance.

The event featured a self-defence seminar, life-saving lessons, lectures on psychology and criminology, and a handgun shooting lesson.

Syed said: "We cover different things like awareness and preparedness for the fight, identifying pre-incident indicators, threats that may be out there and can be detected just by looking, listening and being aware of their surroundings.

Apart from this this we give them soft skills and hard skills, different things they may do to make themselves a harder target and may help in keeping their family safe. Some of the hard skills taught will include some techniques from Imtiaz self-defence and things like edged weapons, impact weapons and chemical agents, commonly referred to as pepper spray.

At the end of the session, we will introduce them to firearms. In a safe and controlled environment, we teach them how to use a handgun, just in case they might find themselves in a situation where they may have to pick up a firearm."



The event kicked off with morning lectures led by Dean Nieuwoudt, who taught participants how to observe their environment, assess it, and assign it to a specific danger level.

- White: A low threat level, only to be used when at home and safe.
- Yellow: An attack is possible but not likely. This should be the default state when in public, where you are aware of your surroundings, potential exit strategies, and are ready to act.
- Orange: A threat is highly likely. At this point, an individual should position themselves toward an exit or prepare to defend themselves.
- Red: The threat has begun.

Nieuwoudt also spoke on how criminals use surprise, speed, and violence to get their way and advised the women that in such a situation, they must be more violent than their attacker. "It may be a life-or-death fight and that must be remembered," he said.

The ladies then stepped out of the lecture room to practice defensive stances and strikes with strike shields as targets, after receiving demonstrations from Nieuwoudt, Syed, and the other instructors. After a quick lunch, the women moved to the shooting range, where they were trained on how to safely handle and fire a pistol.

When Jeff Cooper was working on the lesson plans that have become the curriculum at Gunsite Academy, he developed the Combat Triad. These were three equal elements that combine to make us a harder target against criminal attack. They are Marksmanship, Gun Handling and Mindset. These are the three areas that give us the life-saving skills to overcome violent encounters.

Marksmanship begins with a person obtaining a defensive firearm that is compatible to his particular needs. We have to realize that accurate shooting is not a skill that we are born with. Rather, it comes from getting training to develop the necessary skills and then continual practice to keep those skills fresh. In short, we have to learn to hit targets at various distances and to do so as accurately as possible.

A friend of mine said that we have to remember that there is a lawyer attached to every bullet that we fire. In other words there are a lot of reasons that it is important to develop the skill level that allows you to hit your target and not endanger non-combatants. Gun handling first requires us to learn to handle our defensive handgun safely at all times; see the above comment about a lawyer attached to every bullet that we fire.

Beyond that, we must learn to make a fast draw stroke, find our sights and get on target quickly. But gun handling also involves learning quick reloading and effectively dealing with any malfunction that is characteristic of the chosen firearm. Different guns may be run differently and maintained differently; it is up to the user to know these things about his chosen defensive tool.

Mindset has to do with spotting trouble and knowing effective ways to deal with it. The best pistol shot that you know of is in trouble if he doesn't understand how to recognize a serious problem and have a plan for dealing with that problem.

If I see the potential criminals while they are still a ways down the street, I am keeping an eye on them and have already spotted close cover options and several exits, I am way ahead of the game. Mindset consists of alertness, ways to avoid trouble and ways to deal with it effectively if it is forced upon us. Through mindset we learn to use the skills developed in marksmanship and gun handling to their greatest advantage.

We need to continually remind ourselves that this whole process is not a "one and done" kind of deal. Instead, it is an ongoing education and ongoing practice deal. What we were taught or what we could do 20 years ago is really of little value if we haven't kept up with our training and practice. So it is important to continually think of our defensive skills in terms of the combat triad. Marksmanship, Gun Handling and Mindset – the recipe for survival.



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SAAMI Issues Suppressor Standards

The Sporting Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers' Institute (SAAMI) has issued the first "Voluntary Industry Performance Standards Criteria for Firearm Sound Suppressors for the Use of Commercial Manufacturers." The detailed document took eight years of detailed and highly technical work to complete.

The "Voluntary Industry Performance Standards Criteria for Firearm Sound Suppressors for the Use of Commercial Manufacturers" document contains thread and socket drawings, recommendations on how to communicate intended cartridge, minimum barrel length, maximum firing cadence and maximum rounds before required cooling, procedures and equipment required for suppressor sound measurement, measuring suppressor-to-bore alignment, testing for abusive mishandling, overpressure testing and stress testing.

"These new SAAMI suppressor standards have been eight years in the making and involved a great deal of research, testing and hard work by the SAAMI team and SAAMI member companies," said Joe Bartozzi, SAAMI president and CEO. "Sound suppressors have become standard equipment for many firearm owners, and with more manufacturers producing these hearing-protection devices



to meet consumer demand, SAAMI manufacturing standards were requested by industry."

This new standard covers the thread specifications for attaching suppressors and other muzzle devices to firearms, sound-reduction measurement and other design considerations such as stress testing and over-pressure testing. Serven's presentation this month will delve into the statistical derivation of SAAMI pressure limits and discuss many of the common issues encountered in ballistic testing seen in the real world.

Think it Through

As a young police officer, I adhered to the policy of being armed all the time. I don't recall that our department required it, but they certainly encouraged it. The only trouble was, in our warm climate, I was generally dressed in Wranglers, a western shirt, and boots; finding a way to conceal an off-duty gun was challenging.

Finally, I came upon the idea of rigging an in-the-pants holster so that it would fit into the top of one of my boots, under my starched Wranglers. My Smith & Wesson Model 60, with the bobbed hammer spur, hid away quite nicely.

All was well until one day I was off duty and hanging around on our town square. One of our police officers stopped and told me that they'd had a report of a drunk with a big knife scaring people on the square. The officer went one way, and I went another, intent on finding this joker before someone got hurt.

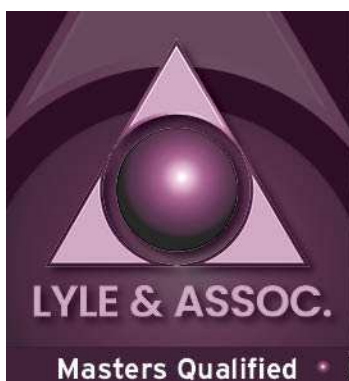
In my search, I walked around the corner on a side street and came nose to nose with the suspect. That gun in my boot, under those heavily starched Wranglers might as well have been in New York City; I would never

have gotten to it in time to do any good. Fortunately, I was able to take hold of the fellow without either one of us getting hurt, and that's the last time I ever carried a gun in the top of my boot. Obviously, I hadn't thought the thing all the way through.

Other folks live in areas where their work or the general social attitude requires carrying their personal defense gun in deep concealment, ankle holsters being just one of the available techniques. While these various methods would be good concealment, they are a pretty slow location for getting the gun into action.

You might be walking out onto a dimly lit street, or be in "that part of town," or you just have one of those inklings that things are not right. That's the time to bring your defense gun out of deep concealment and move it to someplace more accessible. You're not expecting trouble, but you are thinking ahead in case trouble visits you.

In a similar vein, let's think about winter weather. Most of us are so happy because we can now belt on a more substantial defense gun, but then we cover it with a vest and then button a winter coat over the vest. With all of those garments between you and your defense gun, it would almost take a court order to be able to get into action. So again, thinking ahead, we dump that little

deep-concealment gun in an outside pocket of the winter coat and we're good to go.

Just know that Murphy's Law is alive and well. Think about your concealed-carry techniques with special attention to what could go wrong, then work out a way to fix the problem. Plan ahead, and maybe you won't ever come nose to nose with trouble when your gun is way down there in your boot.
